Minister's Message by Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara



Ven. Shinran - A Married Buddhist Monk

Happy New Year! I hope you have had a good start to the year 2024. As resident minister of the Berkeley Buddhist Temple, I would like to extend my deepest gratitude for your support and dedication during the last year. Because of your support, BBT was able to hold regular meaningful Sunday services, develop various programs, and hold our first in-person bazaar after three years of COVID-19 restraint. It is my sincere hope that we will continue to move forward in the year 2024 as well!

In January we observed Ven. Shinran's annual memorial service (Jpn. *Hoonko*). Ven. Shinran is the founder of our school Jodo Shinshu Buddhism, and this makes *Hoonko* one of the most

important services in our tradition. Therefore, the Dharma theme for January was the life and teaching of Ven. Shinran Shonin.

Ven. Shinran was a dedicated Buddhist monk and a serious seeker. He had a deep and profound understanding of Buddhism. During his long life in 13th century medieval Japan, he faced many situations which allowed him to deepen his appreciation of the Buddha Dharma. One of these unique life events was his decision to marry.

Buddhist precepts preclude monks and nuns from marrying. Ven. Shinran, however, decided to marry Eshinni and have a family. It is said that he was the first Buddhist monk to officially announce his marriage. Of course, before making this decision, I assume he struggled between observing Buddhist precepts and following a natural desire as a young man. What was it that made him decide to marry? It was the teaching of Amida Buddha. Ven. Shinran received guidance from Master Honen. Master Honen practiced the Nembutsu recitation with such dedication that he is said to have done so 60,000 or 70,000 times a day. He was not only a dedicated Nembutsu practitioner, but one of the most scholarly monks in those days, with broad knowledge and deep understanding of the Buddhist doctrine. With his understanding of Amida Buddha's deep compassion and unconditional acceptance, he advised Ven. Shinran as follows,

"One should not marry if marriage distracts one from appreciating the Dharma and reciting the Nembutsu. However, one may marry if marriage is not an obstacle for appreciating the Dharma and one can continue to recite the Nembutsu."

Both Ven. Shinran and Master Honen followed the path of Amida Buddha, with his great aspiration to guide and embrace all sentient beings. In other Buddhist paths, it matters whether one is celibate or not because of the precepts. However, for Amida Buddha, this is not a concern; nor is one's social status, financial situation, or the state of one's health. No matter what kind of life one may live, Amida Buddha's aspiration is to provide the guidance of wisdom and compassionate embrace. This is a broad safety net that accommodates all beings. We are not required to change ourselves to fulfill the requirements of a particular Buddhist path. All we need

to do is to truly realize Buddha's compassionate acceptance and entrust ourselves to it. As we voice the Nembutsu recitation we express our grateful response to the Buddha's acceptance.

Amida Buddha's unconditional acceptance abandons no one. This gave Ven. Shinran the confidence to enter into and declare his marriage. It also gave him the strength to deal with the many other challenges he encountered in his 90-year life.

It is my sincere hope that each of us will continue to listen to the teaching deeply and leads a spiritually fulfilled life this year as well.

"Why Is Life Such a Mess?"

"All right, the First Noble Truth is true," I complained, "Life is fundamentally unsatisfactory. My poor husband, Bill, has been a textbook example. Since the end of November, he has suffered the Pain of Losing What He Values, namely his health; the Pain of Getting What He Does Not Want, namely pneumonia complicated by an empyema, leading to the Pain of Association with What He Hates, namely this hospital room for forty days; the Pain of Not Getting What He Wants, namely a quick recovery; and let us not forget the Pain of Pain Itself, both caused by the pneumonia and inflicted by some of the treatments he got in the hospital. Yes, I know that troubles like this, in various forms, happen to everybody sooner or later. But why? Why is life such a mess?"



"First, because of impermanence," my protective Gandharva explained. "Everything fades away in time, including Bill's eighty-one-year-old immune system that had become too weak to prevent this. Second, you are not in control. Everything that happens in your world is due to myriad causes and conditions, most of which you cannot control. Your own actions are one of the factors affecting things, but their effect is often more limited than you would wish. For example, Bill undoubtedly saved his life by telling you to call 911, but he could not get cured in less than forty unpleasant days."

"What about me?" said Death, appearing at the door looking stereotypic in his black cape, though hospital rules compelled him to wear a mask and visitor's badge and leave his scythe at home. "I didn't get this sick octogenarian who should have been easy prey! These interfering doctors!"

"Life has its good side too!" said a doctor. "I've found Bill fit to go home."


