During the month of August, temple activities tend to slow down. Dharma school is no longer in session and weekly Dharma family services come to a temporary pause. Some would say that the temple is on a much needed "summer break," especially when thinking about all of the temple activities that occurred in the past few months. In April we were able to reopen the temple to limited in-person activities, but unfortunately in June we reverted to virtual-only activities due to the high incidence of COVID-19 in Alameda and Contra Costa counties.

Although we are still greatly affected by ebb and flow of COVID-19 in our communities, I am still glad that we can remain connected virtually and in-person. Despite all of this, we still had a virtual Satsuki Bazaar in May and more recently joined

Berkeley Higashi Honganji Buddhist Temple for an in-person Obon Odori event. Thank you to the temple's fundraising committee, led by Takashi Nikaidoh, for a successful virtual event. Thank you to each of you for your participation in the virtual event and your continued support of the temple. I am hopeful that we can gather and host an in-person bazaar and Obon Odori next year.

In September, we will resume Sunday service and Dharma School. The temple's COVID-19 Response committee continues to meet on a regular basis to evaluate our reopening guidelines. During our most recent meeting, we made the careful decision to allow in-person activities during the CDC's Orange-High Community Level tier. As you are aware, current guidelines require us to cease in-person activities in the Orange tier. This change will go into effect on September 1, 2022. Please note that anyone attending in-person events in the Orange tier will be required to follow additional safety protocols to ensure the health and safety of everyone present. Safety protocols include in-person capacity limits, social distancing, enhanced air exchange/airflow, the use of a high particulate filtering mask (N95, KN95, etc.), and certain health screening criteria. A revised re-opening grid will be distributed to all members prior to September. For those who still wish to remain virtual, Sunday services will continue to be livestreamed.

I think that the concept of rest is very important, especially for an organization like ours, made up entirely of volunteers. The temple would cease to run without the help and guidance that each of you provide to the organization. Please be sure to take some time to rest and rejuvenate from all of the hustle and bustle of the prior months. We have the exciting Fall months to look forward to with the start of weekly family Dharma services and Dharma School. I hope to see everyone, well-rested and energized in September, in-person or virtually, when Dharma family services and Dharma School resumes.

Minister's Message by Rev. Kuwahara



2022 Gathering of the GenX Sangha

I was born in 1975. This birth year (between 1960 and 1982) makes me part of the so-called Generation X. There is a group I belong to called GenX Dharma Teachers Sangha. It is made up of people in this age group in the US., Canada, South America, and Europe who teach the Buddha Dharma. It grew out of the "Next Gen" conference held at the Garrison Institute in New York in 2011. Since then, a gathering has been held every two years at different locations, attracting 40-50 teachers from different Buddhist lineages.

In 2019, the GenX Dharma Teachers Sangha met at the Great Vow Zen Monastery in Oregon. After that gathering, I was invited to join the planning committee for the next conference in 2021. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2021 conference was changed from an in-person to online event. I stayed on the planning committee and helped to organize the 2022 in-person gathering at the Won Dharma Center (WDC) in Hudson, New York, which ran from July 12th to 17th.

The Won Dharma Center is a meditation/retreat center based on the teachings of Ven. Sotaesan, the founding master of Won Buddhism, a Korean Zen tradition. The Won Dharma Center was dedicated 11 years ago and is set on 400+ beautiful, wooded acres in upstate New York. Despite the difficulties of the COVID-19 pandemic, about 40 of us from different lineages came together for a wonderful gathering thanks to the support of the WDC staff.

I have been involved in the GenX Dharma Teachers Sangha for over 10 years and have learned many valuable things from the other members. We are all Buddhist practitioners, dedicated to spread the Dharma, but we each represent different styles of Buddhism. There are monks and nuns leading monastic lives, priests serving at temples, Dharma teachers supporting Buddhist communities, and Buddhist chaplains. At our gatherings, we have many small group discussions, from which I always receive new perspectives which cause me to revisit the teachings of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism and renew my understanding of the Buddha Dharma.

Each gathering has a theme. This year's theme was "Past, Present and Future". In one of our group discussions, we talked about the current social divide in the US. Some participants were from blue states while others were from red states. All of us expressed difficulties in dealing with the polarization, especially with social network posts and the backlash from members who support the other side. I learned the importance of the Buddhist teaching of the middle path. As leaders of Buddhist sanghas and communities, our role is to reduce the tension between the

two extremes. Sometimes, due to the three poisons within ourselves, we go too far and pour more fuel on the flame, intensifying the situation. When we live mindfully and reflect deeply upon ourselves in the Light of the Buddha Dharma, we can find balance.

Such reflection also allows us to realize that we see other people with self-centered and narrow views. When we truly recognize them as individual human beings, we can cultivate acceptance and even respect for those whose opinions differ from our own. Such acceptance is the key to healthy and constructive dialogue, leading to mutual understandings. It won't bring about an immediate solution, but it would put us on a meaningful and steady path toward it.

This is one example of the "Dharma nutrition" or "Dharma food-for-thought" I received and digested from the 2022 GenX Dharma Teachers Sangha conference. I deeply appreciate the gift of the teachers' guidance and Dharma friendship. It is a gift I hope to share with you, the Berkeley Sangha.

"What's it to you?" I asked.

"If you must know, I'm annoyed by that row of lanterns at the Obon service," he said. "There are only seven of them! In a whole year!"

"What! Seven deaths of temple members are not enough for you?"


"It's no more than I would expect in a pre-Covid year! After the winter surge of Covid, in a superannuated congregation like this one, I had a right to expect a lot more! Why couldn't your temple be like those big churches that insisted on holding in-person services with hymn singing, even before there were vaccines? Their services turned into huge superspreader events, in their congregations and the community beyond! Dozens of ministers died of Covid with their parishioners. But your temple had to listen to the CDC, and you Buddhists had to get vaccinated, get boosted, wear masks in public, and do all that stuff that rigs the odds in Covid roulette against me. When I saw this bunch of octogenarians facing this deadly epidemic, I thought I had everything going for me here. But you've cheated me! Against all expectation, most of you have survived!"

"Yes," said the voice of the Buddha as he appeared on my bookshelf, "this sangha has managed to do as I taught and combine compassion with wisdom. Buddhists should always try to do the compassionate thing, after doing their best to make sure they know what they're doing."




Oakland A's Tailgate - August 21st


This is an image of a flag -- not the exact image -- that will be flying at the tailgate site in Section A8. The flag will have a big "A" -- look for it!


